Reflection on the Readings

"It is not good for the man to be alone," God says in the reading from Genesis. Humans are social beings: God created us to live and work together, to share our lives, to care about and for each other. Shortly after this story in Genesis, Cain asks the rhetorical question: "Am I my brother's keeper?" The rest of the Hebrew and Christian scriptures answer with a resounding: "YES!"

The great sign of the social nature of humankind is marriage, in which the "two become one body, the two shall become as one." Another sign is the Eucharistic celebration, in which "we, though many, are one body, for we all share in the one loaf and in the one cup." Marriage and Eucharist are signs of sharing lives and living together.

Our world is shattered every day by the many scourges of injustice: racism, sexism, poverty, hunger, homelessness, war. We are constantly violating the fundamental principle: "let no one separate what God has joined." God has joined us in a society of brothers and sisters because it is not good for us to be alone: let no one separate that society through collusion in injustice.

Respect Life Month

October is *Respect Life Month* for the Catholic Church in the US. This celebration is based in Jesus's own declaration of his earthly mission: "I came so that they might have life, and have it abundantly" (John 10:10). The sanctity and dignity of human life must be of primary importance for Catholics. This profound respect for human life should lead us to seek justice not only for pregnant women and children, but also for all those whose sacred value is undermined through violence, racism, discrimination of any kind, and the growing inequality of wealth and education.

God, you have given each of us the gift of life, forming us to be the image of God in the world. Help us always to perceive in every human life, from conception to natural death, the indwelling presence of your Divine Majesty, that we may advocate for the dignity of every human being. Amen.

Dear Friends in the Lord,

Every October the Catholic Church in the United States celebrates Respect Life Month, and the first Sunday of October is observed as Respect Life Sunday. As Catholics, we are called to cherish, defend, and protect those who are most vulnerable, from the beginning to the end of their lives, and at every point in between. During the month of October, the Church asks us to reflect more deeply on the dignity of every human life and the value of all that God has created.

Human dignity is the foundation upon which our rich tradition of Catholic Social Teaching is built. Many have referred to Catholic Social Teaching as our "best kept secret." I find it very frustrating that this gem is still unknown to so many people, including the majority of Catholics. We have so much to offer the polarized and divisive politics of our time. If more people understood the importance of valuing human dignity across the life span, our world would be a more peaceful place.

Abortion, immigration, and the host of other contentious issues that are dividing our country and Church during this election year are certainly complicated realities that call for lots of patient listening and careful discernment. How can we apply our traditions of Catholic Social Teaching and Ignatian Spirituality to these complex questions? I'm happy that a group of our parishioners is on retreat this weekend at Eastern Point in Gloucester. Wouldn't it be great if all Catholics across the country could go on retreat to savor God's love before casting a vote this November!
